Dear Zion,

"God is nowhere?" OR "God is now here."

Sometimes we hear people say: "God is nowhere". Maybe this is how you are feeling. Asaph, the author of Psalm 73 also felt like that. At first, he was very upset. He almost throws in the towel as far as his faith is concerned (verses 1-2). The reason? Asaph saw how well the wicked are doing and that they are enjoying life. They slander and insult without worrying or getting in trouble. They step on everyone. They only get richer and more prosperous (verses 3-11).

However, Asaf is doing very badly. He was struggling. He felt that his faith was a waste of time because his life was a struggle (verses 13-14). But then Asaph does a very good thing. He chooses to think carefully about everything so that he does not lose his faith. Perhaps he was rolling a stone in the way of other believers (verses 13-16). He chooses to follow God's handiwork and end up with all those prosperous wicked. Eventually things turn out badly for them (verses 17-20).

Asaph discovers something else about God. He discovered that God never left him alone. God still takes Asaph by the hand and He leads him (verse 23). Therefore, Asaph confesses that there is nothing in heaven or on earth that means more to him now than the Lord. God is his strength (verses 25-26). The result: Asaph moved from "God is nowhere" to "God is now

here". "Nowhere" then turns into two new words in his life: "now here". Learn from Asaph that it is a wise choice to move from "God is nowhere" to "God is now here".

WOZ SPIRITUAL LIFE



This is a picture of the church in Adeline, Illinois, where I attended Vacation Bible School in the mid-1970's. For one week of the summer in the 1970's, I would stay at my grandma's house in the country and we would attend VBS together at her church — she as a helper in the kitchen and me, a timid elementary student. It was a little scary at first to go, as I did not know any of the other kids or how to look up Bible verses. The concept of "church" was somewhat foreign to me — my family didn't go to church.

Being at Grandma's for the week of VBS consisted of a daily Bible story in my class of 4 other students with my teacher — a grandmotherly, kind lady, Miss Newcomer, whom I adored. Our "classroom" was a section in the sanctuary — each class had an "area" of one or two darkstained, oak pews in which to call their "classroom". Down the middle of these pews there was a wooden partition — a reminder of the once traditional practice that men sit on one side and women on the other while attending church services (this church was built in 1898).



"Craft" time involved making something out of construction paper using scissors and old-fashioned paste. "Recreation" time were simple, outdoor group games that didn't involve any props. At "Snack" time, we all were lead across the quiet street to the white, wood-

sided building that was the location of the church kitchen, which was in the basement, reminiscent of the "Walton family's" style kitchen. We went through the line and were served ice-cold Kool-Aid poured from stocky, metal pitchers beaded with condensation, and homemade cookies. We sat with our classes on rustic, but sturdy, white painted tables and benches that were covered with thick, clear plastic tacked in place so as to be easily wiped clean by Grandma, and the other kitchen helpers, of snack-time crumbs and craft-time paste. I memorized my bible verses, sang children's church songs together with the other classes (accompanied by Miss Newcomer at the piano at the front of church), made new friends, then collapsed into bed each night at Grandma's house, said a prayer of thankfulness for Jesus being in my heart, and would fall asleep to the sound of chirping crickets, anxious to get to go back to the church the next day and do it all over again! I remember the feeling of being loved, cared for and nurtured in the love of Jesus by all those who were associated with VBS!

I think of this past month of June — Zion's VBS 2024 — and I know there are kids that attended that week that are feeling the same way I did, too, as a young child. Some may have come from unchurched families that were as timid as I was about being introduced to the Bible, learning bible verses and singing fun songs about trusting Jesus. There's not a doubt in my mind that they felt loved, cared for and nurtured in the love of Jesus while collapsing into bed each night, excited for the next day of VBS! And for all of that, I say THANK YOU, Pastor, Wendy, Bev, teachers, craft leaders, recreation director Nick, kitchen helpers and everyone who played a part of any kind at Zion's VBS! WELL DONE leading these children to Christ Jesus, their Savior! (And thank you, Grandma Pair ♥)

Let the little children come to me, and do not hinder them, for the kingdom of heaven belongs to such as these.

Zion will hold regular church service on July 14-9:15am outside. Bring a chair!




